
Schramm Nature Preserve


- Currently under construction between 500W and 600W (Mt. Comfort Rd.) and expected to open this summer to connect to the 500W—400W section.

Ephemeral Walk and Weed Wrangle

Join us for a wildflower identification walk at Thornwood Nature Preserve and witness the full spectrum of spring flowers in bloom! As part of this ephemeral walk, we will also focus on eliminating invasive garlic mustard. Bring gloves and dress for the weather!



Garlic Mustard, an Invasive Weed

Eliminating this invasive weed can help allow a wider diversity of spring plants to prosper at Thornwood Nature Preserve. Garlic mustard is commonly found in woodland habitats in North America and can advance across the forest floor at a rate of 20 feet per year. A single garlic mustard plant can produce up to 350 to 7,000 seeds depending on the size of the plant, and these seeds can stay viable in the ground for up to 10 years

ADAPT trial for Seed Savers Exchange

In February, I signed up to be a part of the ADAPT trial with Seed Savers Exchange after a talk by Landrace

Gardener, Joseph Lofthouse at the online 11th Seed Library Summit. (If you haven't read his Landrace

The purpose of this project is to help Seed Savers Exchange decide which collection varieties to include in

future catalogs based on appealing traits. There were trials for sunflowers, dwarf tomatoes, romaine lettuce

and white and gold beets.

I was sent seeds on three types of collard greens and growing guides, with the goal of growing them,

observing their progress, then noting certain attributes at harvest. Traits to observe include appearance, bolt

resistance, flavor, insect resistance, vigor, and winter hardiness. All observations are then posted on
